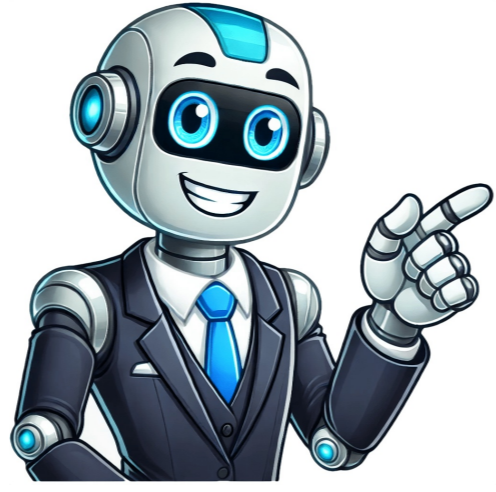

Don't say, for example, 'I enjoyed it much' or 'We much agree'. Say 'I enjoyed it very much' or 'We very much agree'.In negative sentences, you can use much without 'very'.The situation is not likely to change much.2. 'much' meaning 'often'You can also use much in negative sentences and questions to mean 'often'.She doesn't talk about them much.Be Careful!Don't use 'much' in positive sentences to mean 'often'.
