We have put together these suggested itineraries to help you see everything in your specific areas of interest, whether they be special events and attractions, arts and culture, architecture and places of interest, shopping, nightlife and entertainment, or relaxing and relaxing. 1, 2- and 3-Day Special event itineraries " Attractions in Washington, D.C. Special Events " Attractions in Washington, D.C. The must-see attractions in Washington, DC, range from the historical to the cultural to the gastronomic. Follow these suggested itineraries to make sure you take advantage of all the things to do in Washington, DC. 1 Day: Start the day with lobbyists and other drivers and agitators at the Mobil Four-Star Hay-Adams Hotel (16th and H Sts, NW), where the price is right for breakfast overlooking the White House. Next, walk the few blocks to the White House Visitor Center (1450 Pennsylvania Ave NW), where you can watch a video and exhibits about the first families and learn about the architecture, furnishings and other details of the building. Allow yourself at least 20 to 90 minutes to tour the center. White House staff lunch at Mobil Two-Star Old Ebbitt Grill (675 15th St, NW). This restaurant is not far from the White House and has velvet cabins, and marble bars, brass, and bezel glass like a 1900 salon. The old beer steins are on display, as well as a walrus head caught by President Teddy Roosevelt. You should try the three cheese ravioli or steak and egg toast for lunch. Spend the afternoon in the former patent office building, newly christened the Donald W. Reynolds Center for American Art and (Eighth and F Sts, NW). The newly renovated two-block museum houses the Smithsonian National Portrait Gallery and Museum of Art. Take a break on the terrace on the second floor of the building. Explore the art galleries and other shops in the surrounding Penn Quarter and dine at one of the many trendy restaurants. Zaytinya (701 9th St, NW) is a favorite place where you can have the smallest pasta-filled meat balls called 'manti nepla' that are covered with roasted garlic yogurt and paprika butter. Go Asian at Teams (400 8th St, NW) for boxes of bento, some with the best price fresh salmon in town. For wood oven pizzas, try Matchbox (713 H St, NW) or have a perfect Angus mini-bourgeoisie on toasted brioche with onion straws. 2 Days: Check the Washington National Cathedral website (3101 Wisconsin Ave NW) for tours and educational center programs. This beautiful building was made of Indian limestone and features intricate carvings inside and outside, has a 30-story central tower and 215 stained glass windows. Bring binoculars to see the more than 100 gargoyles. Take the elevator to the towers for a panoramic view of the city and beyond. Lunch at one of the best pizza restaurants in the United States: Dos Amys (3715 Macomb St NW). This gourmet pizza tastes different because the owners follow strict rules about the type of ingredients used, and then introduce it into a wood burning oven. When it's done, they put a little extra virgin olive oil on top. One type to try is the pizza covered with salami, sweet peppers, garlic and mozzarella. You will find unique offerings such as clams (in the shell) in other pizzas. Step into Washington Consignments (3226 Wisconsin Ave NW), where the wealthy sell their decorative arts and furniture after redecorating, or where they collect things to send to homes in Nantucket and the Eastern Shore. After lunch, head to southern Massachusetts for a walk around the Row Embassy. Pass at the Museum Society In Anderson House (2118 Massachusetts Ave, NW), a century Beaux Arts mansion belonged to Larz and Isabel Isabel that he began his home to a descendant organization of officers of the revolutionary war, the Cincinnati society. The great building is interesting in its own right and for the murals, art and historical exhibitions. If you'd rather go back to the city and try a new dining experience, make reservations for low-country cuisine at Indigo Landing (1 Marina Dr, Alexandria) and try Hama with bacon, lime bean, corn, tomato, succotash crab. 1, 2, and 3-ashing Suggested itineraries for arts culture in Washington, DC 1, 2 and 3-Day Suggested Culture You can visit countless museums in this city, and it is home to several fine performing arts institutions. Here are some suggested itineraries that will help you get the most out of DC's arts and culture: 1 day: A must-see for any visit to Washington now and for the foreseeable future is the Donald W. Reynolds Center for American Art and Portraiture (Eighth and F Sts NW), the two-block home to the Smithsonian Collections. and the storage and study center of the Fundaci3n Luce. In a new shopping center, Gallery Place, shops include Aveda, Banana Republic, Benetton and a 14-screen cinema. understanding and appreciation of these small objects used as jewels, ornaments, religious symbols and artifacts through ages. Penn Quarter also has a lot of art in galleries. Of all the gallery, do not miss the Zenith, based here for more than two decades, with his contemporary art and a neon creation room. The fourth Thursday every month, there is a Walk in Gallery. Art galleries are open until 8 pm and Starbucks hosts a poetry reading. The memorial pays tribute to more than 200,000 African American soldiers who fought in the Civil War. The University's main campus houses a gallery of fine arts with changing exhibitions. A jewel of the neighborhood is the world of Candida's books (1541 14th ST NW), one of the best bookstores dedicated to travel in the country. Other popular stores include Go MAMA GO (1809 14th St NW) for colorful gifts and illustrations; vintage MEEPS & AUNTE NEENSIE (1520 or st nw), and wild women wear red (1512 or st nw) for design shoes. Some of the best food for the soul in the city can still be held in the bowl of Ben's chili (1213 or st NW), founded in 1958 and became famous partly for the enthusiasm of Bill Cosby. A classic meal: half smoke, cheese fries and milk shake: it costs less than \$10.
