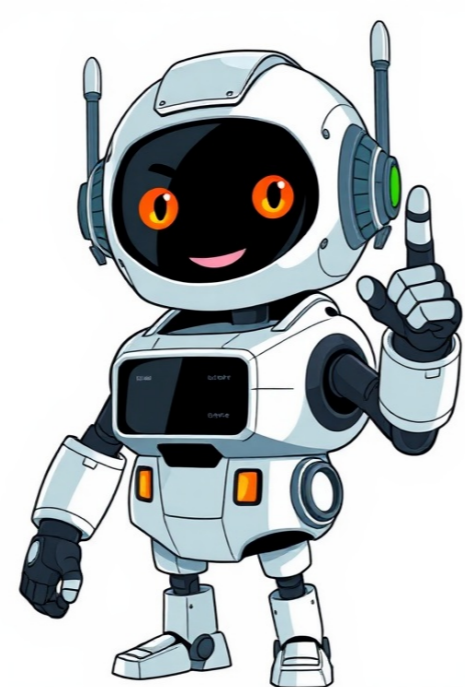


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Their vs. ThereThe quick answer is no! They dont mean the same thing. They may sound similar and they may have similar spellings, yet their and there have nothing in common in regard to their definitions.In fact, their" and there are two different words, and not only do they have completely different meanings and uses in sentences, they also fall into different grammatical categories. One is a pronoun, whereas the other is an adverb. To see all the meanings of each, as well as their grammatical functions, check the two dedicated sections below, where you will be able to find some great illustrative examples.When do we use their?Their is a pronoun, mainly used as a determiner. More exactly, it is used to show belonging or relating to a certain group (of people or animate beings). The same word can also be used for something that belongs or relates to a particular person, when using his or her might be inappropriate, or irrelevant.Example 1: Our friends and their children will join us for dinner tonight. their is a pronoun used to show belonging or relation to a certain group of people.Example 2: Did that person give you their name or their phone number? their may also be preferred in order to avoid using his or her when referring to something belonging or relating to a particular person.When do we use there?While their is a seemingly simple word, with two distinct uses and a clear meaning, there is a little bit more complex, in regard to the contexts where it may appear. Definitions TheirTheir" is the possessive form of the plural pronoun they, used as an adjective preceding a noun (e.g., their company, their books on the shelves, their promotion to upper management).Despite being plural, "their" has also come to be used as a replacement for the singular possessive pronouns his and her, as an indefinite singular antecedent (i.e., when the gender of a person is unknown or when referring to people in a mixed group or crowd). This use of "their" is common in casual conversation and informal written English, but whether it is used in academic or professional writing often depends on style guide requirements, which typically prefer the more verbose "his or her" or alternating gendered pronouns. Someone parked his or her car in a towing zone.There" has multiple functions and can be used as an adverb, noun, pronoun, adjective, or interjection.As an adverb, "there" can refer to in or that place, a moment in time or a point in a process, or a particular or specific matter. It can also call attention to a particular spot. My wife will be there soon. (referring to in or that place) She paused there to let him reply. (referring to a moment in time) I was right to be sad there. (referring to a specific matter) There he is! (calling attention)As a noun, "there" refers to a state or condition. Once you get into college, you have to face it alone from there on.As a pronoun, "there" replaces a noun where the verb comes before the subject or the subject is not mentioned. It can also supplant a place name or a specific time-based noun. There is no way to fail. (replacing a noun) She went there last week. (replacing a place name) We were there when that bell rang. (replacing a time-based noun)As an adjective, "there" provides emphasis. See the lady there for directions.As an interjection, "there" can express a variety of feelings and emotions, ranging from relief, satisfaction, and approval, to encouragement and consolation. There! Lets dive a little deeper. This word acts as an adverb, a particular kind of adverb called a demonstrative. It indicates location or place. Use there to point to a physical location: Put your phone over there on the table. I would like to go there. There are the ducks! To remember the spelling of this one, think of the word where, and just replace the w with a t. Where? There. There can also introduce a concept or idea. There is a chance it might rain today, for example. This usage is similar to the way we say it is. In the phrase it is going to rain today, it doesnt necessarily refer to something specific. Similarly, if we say, There is nice weather today, were not thinking of a specific location as much as a general there. ProTip: There can be used with is and are, as in, there is/are. However, we dont say their is/are or theyre is/are. Their is a type of pronoun called a possessive pronoun, like my or your. Use their to show something belongs to a person or group: The runners received their medals. The company has announced their new policy. I love that restaurant because their chicken is the best! This rule may seem tricky, but theres a little mnemonic device for remembering this one: their is the only there/their/theyre that has an i in it, and I is also a kind of pronoun. Theyre is simply a contraction of the words they are. Imagine that little apostrophe represents an a. Here are some examples: Theyre planning a trip to Europe. (They are planning a trip to Europe.) Theyre really nice! (They are really nice!) Thats where theyre going. (Thats where they are going.) If youre unsure whether to use theyre, try replacing the word with they are. If the sentence sounds correct, then theyre is the right choice. Here are some examples of using two or even all three words together. "There," "their," and "they're" sound similar, but they have very different meanings. It is important to understand the difference between these words because using the wrong one is considered a basic mistake. I live there. There are lots of shops. "There" is like "here," which is also a place. This is easy to remember because "there" contains the word "here." I understand their argument. "Their" is just like "my," "his," "her," and "our," which are also used to show possession. Where are the rabbits? "They're" near the tree. If you cannot expand it to "they are," then you shouldn't be using "they're." Select the right one to fill the gap. "There," "their," and "they're" are common words, and your readers will expect you to use the right one. "They're" is a contraction of "they are." It can always be expanded to "they are." This is a 100% rule! They're not leaving on Saturday now. (Do the expansion test: "They are not leaving on Saturday now.") I cannot believe they're from Boston. (Test: "I cannot believe they are from Boston.") More than 20 people left they're coats in the cloakroom. (Test: "More than 20 people left they are coats in the cloakroom." This is nonsense. Therefore, "they're" is wrong.) My doctor gave me two weeks to live. I hope they're in August. (Comedian Ronnie Shakes) (Test: "I hope they are in August.") Things are only impossible until they're not. (Captain Jean-Luc Picard) (Test: "Things are only impossible until they are not.") "They're" is a contraction. There are two types of contraction: A shortened version of a word (e.g., "cannot" contracts to "can't") One word formed from two words (e.g., "they are" contracts to "they're") Both types of contraction feature apostrophes. In the contraction "they're," the apostrophe replaces the letter "a," and the two words are merged into one.) Remember that a mistake involving one of these words presents a risk to your credibility as a writer. How would you react to this office sign? (It should be "their" not "they're.") "Their" is for possession. It is like "my," "your," "his," "her," "its," and "our." These are called possessive determiners ("possessive adjectives" in traditional grammar). Can you show the guests to their cabins? (Do the "our" test: "Can you show the guests to our cabins?" This sounds okay. Therefore, "their" is correct.) I have seen their footprints before. (Test: "I have seen our footprints before." This sounds okay. Therefore, "their" is correct.) Their all leaving. (Test: "Our all leaving." This is nonsense. Therefore, "their" is wrong. It should be "They're.") Their less likely to cause offence. (Test: "Our less likely to cause offence." This is nonsense. Therefore, "their" is wrong. It should be "They're.") Experience is the name every one gives to their mistakes. (Playwright Oscar Wilde) Here is a little trick to test whether "their" is correct: Use the word "our" instead of "their." If the sentence still makes sense, then "their" is correct. This trick works because "our" and "their" are both possessive determiners used for plurals. "There" is like "here" because it represents a place. ("There" and "here" are both adverbs of place.) "There" has two uses: She is there. There are two apples. The Germans are over there. (In this example, "there" is a specific place.) There is a good reason I'm not attending the party this year. (In this example, it means "a good reason exists.")
